Each day brings many experiences that one may or may not be prepared for in ministry. Seek to explore and share management experiences and techniques for more effective early childhood ministry.

Multicultural Ministry...It's Here!

Early child programs of today have many different faces, from staff members to children. A typical early childhood program may include students of different cultures, religions, or possibly even no religious background at all. Rather than running from such a mix, we should embrace the opportunity to share the saving grace of Jesus' death and resurrection. From building strong relationships, to sharing the Word, to a child's baptism, participants will learn various ways of using differences to minister to others.

School Consolidation: One Way to Keep Lutheran Schools Alive?

Description: As smaller Lutheran schools continue to close, some areas find themselves without choices for Christian education, especially at the elementary level. Includes a potential process for initiating consolidation. (Note: While this presentation may be done in 75 minutes, a full discussion requires about two hours.)

Self-Esteem in Christian Perspective

Description: Self-esteem in students has faded somewhat as a hot topic, but it remains relevant nonetheless. This presentation seeks to provide a Christian construct for self-esteem and its proper role in the lives of students.

Somebody Loves Me: Self-Esteem for Administrators

Dr. Jonathan Laabs has served in various teaching and leadership capacities in Lutheran education for 33 years. He was teacher and building administrator in Lutheran schools in Texas and Michigan for 15 years, served as Director of Teacher Education at Concordia University, Ann Arbor and, for the past thirteen years has served as Executive Director of Lutheran Education Association. Dr. Laabs is a frequent presenter at district, national and international conferences; serves on several district and national boards and committees; and teaches as an adjunct professor at Concordia University, Chicago, where he received his BA (1977) and MA (1980). He earned his Doctor of Education degree from The University of Michigan with an emphasis in Instructional Technology.

Dr. Edward Grube is Director of Publications/Communications for the Lutheran Education Association. Prior to accepting the Call to LEA, Ed was Director of Publications for LCMS District & Congregational Services—School Ministry. Ed also served as a Lutheran school principal for 27 years. He holds both a B.A. (1970) and an M.A. (1975) in education from Concordia University Chicago, which also conferred on him an honorary Doctor of Laws in 2006. Ed is the author of 15 books published by Concordia Publishing House, LCMS School Ministry, and LEA. He has served as an editor and writer for many CPH curriculum publications and LCMS School Ministry projects.

Kathy Slupik has served in various teaching and leadership capacities in Lutheran education for more than 30 years. Kathy earned a B.A. (1977) from Concordia University Chicago. She was a teacher and administrator in Lutheran schools in Chicago for 25 years and has served as Executive Assistant of Lutheran Education Association since 2002.
